"Everything is connected"

One of the significant markers of the papacy of Pope Francis has been his concern to underline the seriousness of the climate crisis and the Christian obligation to take care of our common home. In his 2015 encyclical Laudato Si and his 2023 apostolic exhortation Laudate Deum Pope Francis outlines the challenges facing humanity and the planet and invites us to practice an integral ecology. He is at pains to stress that "Everything is connected" and "No-one is saved alone". (LD # 19).

We are living through tumultuous times, and we can see the distressing impact of financial crises, pandemic, war, political upheaval, disasters caused by climate change, particularly on the world's poorest people and the environment. It is easy to feel overwhelmed by the magnitude of the problems and the paucity of our resources. However, it is good to be reminded of the richness of our traditions of spirituality which can inform an "ecological spirituality grounded in the convictions of our faith" (LS # 216).

The "ecological conversion" described in Laudato Si chapter six, with its emphasis on a joyful sobriety and healthy humility, is made up of many 'simple daily gestures' that help to create a better world, in harmony with creation.

How do we use them for the good of the people whom we are called to serve and respecting the environment in which we live? We've been working with the "Eglise Verte" for years and are proud to be at the Fig Tree level (level 3 of 4)! We continue with the reduction of single portions of packaging (coffee, jam), the extension of recycling, the use of ecological gift wrap...

And there's more to come, especially for the park. At a time when we have less energy to maintain it, opportunities have arisen to take a fresh look at this vast green space: neighbours are planting a vegetable garden, retired gardeners from the Palace of Versailles prune fruit trees and rose bushes, the Higher Institute of the Environment has turned it into a project centre for its students, companies hold their 'Nature Team Building' there, and young people from the chaplaincy spend a day collecting leaves.



The programme also includes 2 days of 'looking after and admiring the park'. So don't expect to see a lake (like in the Palace Park), but come and discover the pond, its water plants and its planted rafts.
